The NIHR Doctoral Award is a 3-year funding opportunity designed to support the career development of all health and social care professionals through PhD research.

This award replaces the NIHR Doctoral Fellowship, NIHR Doctoral Clinical and Practitioner Academic Fellowship, and NIHR Doctoral Local Authority Fellowship. It merges the former fellowships into a single, streamlined scheme to enhance accessibility and simplify the application process.

The award supports research in any scientific discipline or sector that contributes to improving health, including public health and social care, within the NIHR's funding remit (https://www.nihr.ac.uk/nihr-academy-remit-personal-awards).

Clinical or practice time:

If you are a clinician or a practitioner, or a local authority applicant, you can apply for up to 20% clinical or practice time as part of your award.

Eligibility

To be eligible for the Doctoral Award, you must:

- hold a 1st class or 2:1 bachelor's degree or equivalent. If you do not meet this requirement,
 you must normally have a master's degree
- your proposed host organisation must be a recognised Higher Education Institution (HEI), NHS body, local authority, social care organisation, or another provider of health or care services in England
- you should have some prior research experience or research training
- if you are already registered for a PhD (or MPhil with transfer to PhD), you must not have been registered for more than 12 months full-time (100% WTE) by the time the award starts
- your proposed research must be within the <u>NIHR remit</u> (https://www.nihr.ac.uk/nihr-academy-remitpersonal-awards)

What is available through a Doctoral Award?

The Doctoral Award provides comprehensive funding to support you in undertaking a PhD by research. Funding covers:

- the full salary of the award holder for the entire duration of the fellowship at the requested WTE
- costs for the approved research project
- · associated conference fees
- costs for a suitable training and development plan which will lead to further professional development including overseas placement.
- working with people and communities costs

There is no set limit on the total budget you can request, as long as your costs are fully justified to support your research and can demonstrate value for money.

However, some costs have specific caps:

- conference attendance capped at £3,000 for the entire award duration
- computer capped at £1,000
- PhD fees must be costed at the UK Home Fees rate

If your application is successful, we will review your budget in line with the funding committee's recommendations and conditions to ensure value for money and alignment with NIHR requirements.

- letters of support from your contracting organisation and your partner organisation (if applicable)
- research area of interest
- career development programme
- gantt chart of project plan document

letters of support

Choosing a contracting organisation

The Doctoral Award is a personal research training award, meaning you must write and submit your proposal yourself. However, you are required to propose an organisation that will sign off and host the contract of the award.

Your proposed contracting organisation must be:

- a recognised HEI based in England
- an NHS body based in England
- an English local authority
- any other third sector or publicly funded provider of health and/or social care services based in England, such as a hospice or commissioned social enterprise

You must be based in England at your contracting organisation for the duration of the award, except for travel for research, training or development activities as outlined within the proposal.

You must also choose a partner organisation if:

- 1. your employer for the duration of the award will not be your contracting organisation.
- 2. you are requesting salaried clinical or practice time through the award, but you will not undertake it within your contracting organisation

The choice of host organisation and employer is up to you, in discussion with your supervisors, line managers, and mentors. The decision should be based on what is best for your career development and your proposed research and training. We will not support applications in which the individual is living overseas from their contracting organisation.

How to fill in the 'Budget' section of your application

You must request funding under the relevant heading in the 'Budget' section of your application.

You can request:

- your salary on the 'Lead applicant and co-applicants' line under 'Staff costs'.
 - o This should be the actual costs requested, adjusted for FTE uptake of the award.
- salaries for support and shared staff on the 'Other staff' line under 'Staff costs'.
 - o this should be the actual costs requested, adjusted for FTE commitment to the award
- training and development costs on the 'Training and development' line under 'Other research/award costs'
 - o training and development costs are funded at 100% for all contracting organisation types
 - travel and subsistence costs associated with training are funded at the contracting organisation type rate
- equipment and consumables on the 'Equipment' and 'Consumables' lines under 'Other research/award costs'
- research inclusion costs on the 'Research inclusion' line under 'Other research/award costs'
- working with people and communities, previously called patient and public involvement, on the
 'Working with people and communities' line under 'Other research/award costs'
- conference fees, travel, and subsistence on the 'Travel and subsistence' line under 'Other research/award costs'
 - conference fees and associated travel and subsistence are funded at 100% regardless of organisation type
- knowledge mobilisation, dissemination and impact costs associated with sharing your research with others on the 'Knowledge mobilisation, dissemination and impact' line under 'Other research/award costs'
 - costs associated with hosting conferences are not eligible and a budget for open access
 costs is provided separately
