We are inviting researcher-led applications for standalone evidence synthesis research.

We are providing a streamlined pathway for high-impact research by integrating funding routes previously managed under the Health Technology Assessment (HTA), Public Health Research (PHR), and Health and Social Care Delivery Research (HSDR) programmes.

We invite applications for standalone evidence syntheses that address the UK's most pressing health and social care challenges. Our goal is to support:

- rigorous synthesis – projects that employ bias-minimising techniques to resolve conflicting data and reduce uncertainty in critical fields
- better services – research focused on optimising the quality, accessibility, and organisation of health and social care delivery
- health equity – evidence that drives cost-effective interventions to improve population health and proactively reduce inequalities

By unifying these streams, we are empowering researchers to provide the definitive insights that shape our national services and improve lives.

This is a single-stage, researcher-led funding opportunity. Applicants will be expected to submit a full application.

Research specification

Our Evidence Synthesis Programme (ESP) is inviting researcher-led applications for standalone evidence synthesis research. Our new workstream consolidates researcher-led funding opportunities for evidence synthesis previously offered by the Health Technology Assessment (HTA), Public Health Research (PHR), and Health and Social Care Delivery Research (HSDR) programmes.

Background

Our [Evidence Synthesis Programme](#) (<https://www.nihr.ac.uk/research-funding/funding-programmes/evidence-synthesis#one>) funds research that identifies, appraises and combines data from existing research studies to address questions of importance to policymakers, practitioners and the public. The evidence syntheses that we fund use systematic approaches and robust methodologies to provide trustworthy evaluations of existing research and best evidence to inform decision-making.

Funding opportunity scope

The scope of this funding opportunity is broad, covering (but not limited to) the areas below:

- evidence synthesis addressing the clinical and cost-effectiveness – and broader impact – of healthcare treatments, tests, and other interventions
- evidence synthesis focused on improving public health and wellbeing, including studies aimed at reducing health inequalities
- evidence synthesis focused on improving the delivery of health and social care services
- evidence synthesis addressing the effectiveness and cost-effectiveness of social care interventions, with outcomes related to the health and wellbeing of service users and their carers

We seek high-impact evidence synthesis research with national relevance. Submissions that address very narrow questions, or those limited to rapid reviews, scoping reviews, or evidence maps, are outside the scope of this funding opportunity. Proposals may include systematic reviews, employ a range of synthesis methods and may include an economic analysis or modelling component. All applications need to take account of [Best Research for Best Health: The Next Chapter](https://www.nihr.ac.uk/best-research-best-health-next-chapter) (<https://www.nihr.ac.uk/best-research-best-health-next-chapter>) and other wider NIHR priorities.

Study design

This is a single-stage, researcher-led funding opportunity. You will be expected to submit a full application. The chosen synthesis methodology should be appropriate for the research topic and the nature of the available evidence. You must clearly demonstrate your knowledge of the research topic and related current research as well as of evidence synthesis methods. We strongly encourage you to develop proposals through co-production with topic experts and relevant stakeholders which may, for example, include health, public health and social care practitioners; patients, carers, and the public; charities, local authorities, and third sector organisations.

Outputs

Pathways to impact – we are focused on the impact of the research we fund. You are asked to consider the timing and nature of deliverables in your proposals; and encouraged to maximise the impact of your research by explaining how you will mobilise knowledge and ensure that it is useful and relevant to stakeholders such as:

- policy makers
- health, public health and social care practitioners
- charities, and other third sector organisations

- community audiences

Duration and costs

Projects should state timelines for project delivery that are proportionate to the type of evidence synthesis proposed. We expect to commission projects which range in size, scope and cost.

You are advised that we are custodians of public funds and value for money is a key criteria that peer reviewers and funding committee members will assess applications against.

Inclusive research

You must detail how you have considered inclusive research design and sex and gender throughout the whole research lifecycle and provide information on any associated costs.
